HORNDEAN BIODIVERSITY GROUP The HBG is working closely with the Horndean Parish Council Rangers to bring together all those keen on observing, recording and conserving the local wildlife in and around Horndean and most of the Group are also members of the HWT South Down Group. We are now nearing completion of a Biodiversity Action Plan for Horndean, this is an important document calling on local knowledge, help and enthusiasm to conduct surveys and to promote projects that will help to conserve our local wildlife habitats against all the current threats.

NATURE NOTES

It has been an unusual year for wildlife with cold, hot, wet and dry weather with a very late start but apart from timing many species of plants and animals have put in a good appearance including many migrant insects such as the Clouded Yellow butterfly.

BUTTERFLIES in 2013 Notes from John Nundy - The end of the butterfly season has now arrived, autumn is now here and many butterflies will have mated and laid eggs and now disappear into hibernation, demise or migration. Overall 2013 has been a better year than 2012 for butterflies; recently we have seen an influx of Clouded Yellows migrating from France. Small Tortoiseshells have been seen in large numbers throughout the year. Large and Small Whites, common Blue, and Speckled Wood have



been out in good numbers. White Admirals have been absent this year, however Silver-washed Fritillaries have shown up well in the Holt and now a small but well established colony are at Catherington Lith. Moth News Notes from John Vigay - Moths are around throughout the year but for the first 4 months few came to moth traps or were seen in daytime. Tiger moths were target species this year, JN had a Garden Tiger came to his trap and JV had a Ruby Tiger come to his trap in July (1st picture to the right with an unusual view of the brightly coloured underside). Second picture shows a portrait of the Spectacle moth that also came to light on23 August. JN had a number of Hawk-moths come to his trap



with Poplar, Privet and large and small Elephant Hawk-moths. Finally 2 species of day-flying moths were common this year; the Silver-Y moth and the Burnet moth, seen in the 3rd picture of Burnets feeding on Scabious flowers on Catherington Down. Overall around 70 species came to our traps during the summer but some sessions had to be cancelled due to enpredictable weather. JN hastens to add that all moths are released unharmed into the night.

FUNGI There is no doubt that this is an excellent year to see fungi in all shapes and colours. Pictures are all fungi spotted in Clanfield woods at the beginning of October by the volunteer group Over 20 species were seen, many in huge







numbers. The middle picture shows a Ramaria or Coral fungus and on the right Maiden's Bonnets. At the end of October there are some fungi walks in the New Forest being organised by Plantlife, led by members of Hants Fungi Recording Grp. Will help with IDs

Details on the Events Page above. There are simply fungi everywhere! *Fruits, Nuts and Berries* Also an exceptional year as shown on

BBC 'Countryfile'. All our local nature reserves and hedgerows are really loaded, especially blackberries and sloes on



the blackthorn. Also it is a bumper year for healthy acorns, hawthorn and rose-hips. Some of the acorns are on trees that are under 20 years old, although many acorns have become distorted by the Knoppa Gall wasp which has also had a good year.







TREE NEWS - TREE PLANTING

SATURDAY 30TH NOVEMBER is the date when we are planning to complete the final stage of tree planting in Jubilee Field, Horndean. As in the original plan we will be planting about 12 standard trees, mainly Oak, Field Maple and Small-leaved Lime. As last November volunteers will meet in Jubilee Field at 10 am near Jubilee Hall. We hope for better weather this time. Ponds for Wildlife



Our meeting on <u>Wednesday 20th November 2013</u> will be devoted to PONDS. Dr. Naomi Ewald will be giving an illustrated talk on ways to improve the condition of ponds by surveying and studying the needs of aquatic life. Garden ponds of whatever size are an essential feature in bringing a greater variety of wildlife to your garden, especially frogs, newts, dragonflies, birds and numerous aquatic species.

A local pond group will be proposed during the meeting so that local members who have, or are proposing to start a pond, can keep in touch and share problems and maybe start a register of all local ponds, both public and private. There will also be a call for volunteers for pond care.

Planting Trees

The plan this year is to plant 20 standard trees - oaks and field maples at the south end of the field and limes, pines, silver birch, rowan (replacements for two lost) and a wild pear. These are all native species and will form a major part of the proposed **Horndean Tree Trail** which together with Yoell's Copse and local hedgerows, future generations will be able to see most of the native tree species growing in England well into the future, plus it will benefit wildlife and the environment.



As the late autumn colours appear there is less to see in the countryside but it is a good time to see fungi. This blue-green fungi was spotted on a fungal foray in Blagden Copse Clanfield on 2nd November and is thought to be a **Blue Rounhead** *Stopharia caerulea*. Those who came on fungal days with the *Hampshire Fungi Recording Group* experts in the New Forest were able to see a huge number of species and a fine display at the Reptile centre nr. Lyndhurst. In between rain and wind there were a few sunny intervals in which 3 **Red Admirals** were flying along hedgerows near Wick Hanger on 3rd Nov. The next newsletter will be February 2014.
